FOUR CORNERS!

OUR AUGUST MEETING VIA ZOOM

Continuing to observe all pandemic safety precautions, Ring 21 met via Zoom for its August meeting with members checking in from many parts of Southern California.

Erin Kabbash—who has agreed to take over the presidential duties

—called the meeting to order even though he won't officially assume the new office until October's inauguration. At the September meeting we will announce the election winners, and like a another election that is scheduled

to happen (I'm told) in November, our "inauguration" will be via Zoom—not with the traditional hoopla.

The theme for our August meeting was familiar to most members, but with a significant difference (let's face it, these days it seems that every activity

is being done differently). In the past a "Four Corners" meeting meant that four magicians in four corners of the room taught a skill or trick and members moved from one to another about each 15 minutes, so they learn from each presentation.

Our Zoom version had each performer taking the "spotlight," teaching for the whole group, then relinquishing to the next presenter.

Lex Schwartz began with an excellent session on some basic card sleights. These included false cuts and shuffles (including some of his own

ideas), "second deals," and concluded with (that fearful sleight for the new

performer) "palming." All of those present learned a lot—and maybe some

may have gotten over the often felt fear of doing a card sleight.

Erin Kabbash taught a packet trick he called "Reverse Psychology"

and it proved to be an easily learned effect and one that required writing on cards with the dramatic "Pick Me" for a finish.

Karl Johnson called his effect "Ambitious ACAAN" that cleverly combined

the traditional card that keeps jumping to the top, but even better with a card that jumps to a chosen position.

Gerry Schiller finished the evening with what he called "A Simple Matrix."

It's a coin Matrix with four coins and two jumbo cards. The coins manage to assemble themselves under one card and it finishes with a very big coin showing under one of the cards.

Since various versions of the coin matrix are popular, many other members had suggestions about other sleights and approaches to this traditional effect.

With Zoom Sessions now becoming the norm for many rings, the challenge seems to be: which tricks work well in this format, and which tricks

just won't. So the theme for our September meeting will be: find a trick that adapts itself to a Zoom Meeting.

So there won't be any volunteers choosing cards, no one will be reaching into that egg bag (except the magician), and all those "mind reading" effects

will happen over a very long distance.

It certainly promises to be a challenging and intriguing evening.

The Greats of Magic A Series of Capsule Biographies of Famous Magicians Compiled by Gerald Schiller



P.T. Selbit

Though his name may not ring any bells of recognition to many people casually interested in magic history, Selbit was a most important innovator and was responsible for developing many amazing illusions. Some even give him credit for originating and popularizing one of magic's best-known effects: "sawing a woman in two."

Born in London in 1881, Percy Thomas Tibbles worked as a silversmith and later as a journalist. As a young boy, he had become interested in magic, and soon he developed an act doing card and coin manipulation. He decided to reverse the letters of his last name and drop one of the "b's" and he became known as Selbit.

He began to develop and perform effects for the stage, and these included "spirit paintings" in which colors materialized on a canvas and created a painting in the style of an artist chosen by the spectators.

His "mighty cheese" was a large circle of "cheese" that stood on its end and defied even the strongest spectator's attempt to knock it over.

He introduced "walking through a brick wall," an effect that Houdini would incorporate into his act and which was extremely popular.

But Selbit's most famous creation was "sawing a woman in half." He first presented it to an audience in January of 1921 and it was a sensation. He promoted the illusion by having an ambulance parked in front of the theater and having assistants come out to the sidewalk between shows and pour buckets of murky red "blood" in the gutters!

Magician Horace Goldin quickly developed his own version of the trick and when Howard Thurston saw it, both were soon adding the illusion to their acts in the U.S.

When Selbit arrived in the U.S. on a tour, many theaters blocked him from performing the effect since they felt Goldin was the "owner" of it. Selbit sued Goldin in 1921 for stealing his effect but lost his case when the court decided Goldin's version was based on an entirely different principle. In actuality, descriptions of the "sawing" trick had appeared in books many years even before Selbit performed it.

Disgusted by losing the court battles, Selbit returned to England in 1922. He did develop a number of other fascinating illusions based on similar ideas: "destroying a girl," "the indestructible girl," and "crushing a woman." In the crushing illusion, a girl lay in a large box filled with balloons. Another box (almost the same size) with two men in it was lowered from above to nest into the first box. As it came down into the box where the girl was, balloons began popping. Finally the first box was opened and the girl had vanished. When the second box was lifted from the first, she magically re-appeared!

Selbit died in 1938 at the age of 57. Horace Goldin died the following year.

However, the popularity of his "sawing a woman in half" continued to grow over the years—in many manifestations. Harry Blackstone performed a buzz-saw version for many years (as did his son), and numerous other ways of slicing, dicing, and mutilating assistants became popular as well.

Credit, however, for popularizing the original should go to P.T. Selbit, one of the very first to ever cut a woman in two—and then, fortunately, to return her to her original status.
